





Lloyd Binder at Sámi Dinner

Lloyd Binder, retired manager of the Inuvik reindeer herd, will speak again at our Sámi dinner this time telling us of his family's historic adventures in Canada.



Lloyd's grandfather, Sámi herder, Mikkel Pulk, his wife Anna, and children, arrived from Kautokeino, Norway in 1931. Pulk and two other herders met 5000 reindeer coming from Alaska and brought them on to Inuvik. It took five years—the longest reindeer drive in history. Much drama was encountered and 2000 reindeer were lost. Lloyd will bring family photos such as the one on the left showing Mikkel and Anna shortly after their arrival.



This may be our last chance to enjoy a reindeer dinner and Lloyd. He says his health may not allow him to travel far next year, and changes are being made with the reindeer and the meat might no longer be available.

You Can't Keep Trolls a Secret!

"Small kids love the Troll Garden," says Jackie Laprise a Midsummer Festival volunteer. But the Garden behind the tents is not always easy to spot. There, trolls live behind the leaves in secret trails in the woods. Poul Erik built them a quaint water wheel. Benches allow adults a rest, and bubbles, puzzles and plasticine entertain children. Research Your Family Tree at the Centre

The SCS sponsored Scandinavian Genealogy Group meets in the Icelandic Room one Saturday find North American immigraa month at the Scandinavian Centre. We welcome new members and visitors – we have wifi, computers, and access to historical BC birth, marriage and death records thanks to the Icelandic Canadian Club of BC. We assist with Nordic family history in person or via e-mail.

Members experienced in Nordic and Canadian and US genealogy can help you access less known and paid Nordic databases. Some advisors have special interests, like Scandinavian inventions, Nordics in BC fishing, or BC Nordic women's history. One member is indexing records from the First (1892) Scandinavian Lutheran Congregation of Vancouver.

Bring questions and a summary of family information. We tion and census records, or church records from Scandinavia. To find 'lost' living relatives bring any names, addresses, place names, dates, etc. We can recommend genealogy software and DNA genealogy testing services too.

Our group gets very excited about finding and sharing people's ancestral family records. A lot of Nordic records are available on-line, but sometimes searches take a while. Nonetheless, we do find those families! We keep the Genealogy room open both Saturday and Sunday during Scandinavian Midsummer Festival. Our BC Genealogy society's boutique has books and family history supplies.

We also participate in other events together with the SCS such as the Gulf Of Georgia Cannery's 2019 multicultural exhibit May 1st. Outside events Promote Nordic Genealogy and family history and the activities of both the BCGS and the SCS.

Sámi Searvi Formed

A Sámi Searvi (group) was formed by Karen Sorensen supported by Poul Jouksu and the SCS. Karen, of Norwegian Sámi descent, has helped the SCS organize Sámi National Day Celebrations. She also lent us her beautiful Sámi tools and clothing for display.


The Sámi were the first people moving into the north of Norway, Sweden, Finland and Russia after the ice melted 10,000 years ago. Roman historian, Tacitius, mentioned them in 98 BC. Archaeology suggests they were also the first to use skis. They lived successfully as nomads in that harsh environment by following reindeer for food, tools, and tents. Clothing

and tools were finely decorated as they couldn't carry works of art around with them.

Today, like Canada's own Northern people, the Sámi search for a place for themselves in modern culture and economy while keeping the traditions of their heritage.

Karen encourages anyone to join the Searvi. "There is much to learn, and we have fun if we are together" she says.

The Searvi is helping with our Sámi National Day Celebration, February 1st. We will have movies, documentaries, and talks all afternoon as well as coffee. A social hour follows. then the reindeer dinner with slides by Lloyd Binder, Inuvik.
